Between farm visits and outreach events, OAK's field staff gathered for a full day of professional development training on climate-smart practices. Adam Jones from USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Kentucky led the OAK group through tools and practices to support farmers and field staff in the development of prescribed grazing and cover crop plans. We walked the pastures at Elmwood Stock Farm identifying grasses and forbs, discussing considerations for stocking rates and identifying management strategies farmers can use to improve forage quality over time. # A Common Language for Measuring Farm Sustainability

OAK's Climate-Smart Team had the pleasure of spending time with leadership from the Sustainable Food Trust (SFT) recently. Adele Jones, Executive Director, and Patrick Holden, Founder and CEO, visited Kentucky from the United Kingdom to discuss the Global Farm Metric (GFM), a 'common language' for measuring farm sustainability and a globally harmonized framework that takes a holistic approach to measuring sustainability on farms. Over the past 2.5 years, OAK has worked with SFT to translate the GFM for application in the US and to develop the Farm Sustainability Assessment Tool (F-SAT), now available for farmers to use in Kentucky through OAK's new climate-smart project. OAK staff enjoyed diving into the details of the GFM, walking the fields at Rootbound Farm to see the tool in action and connecting with leaders in human health, ecosystem services and true-cost accounting from the Environe Institute and the True Cost Accounting Accelerator. Later that day, OAK's Executive Director, Brooke Gentile, joined a group of 11 panelists to discuss a shared, new vision of health in Kentucky that values farm-level ecosystem services, farm worker health and high-quality food grown and raised on Kentucky farms.



## Farmer Profile: Aaron and Irina Lange, Foxfire Farm

Foxfire Farm in Casey County officially launched as a business in 2022, but the roots of its existence are deep and wide - drawing on generational knowledge, supported by evolving farming systems and connected to a web of farmer mentors and partners.

Aaron Lange and his wife Irina formed Foxfire Farm on land that the Lange family has nurtured and cultivated since 1991. Aaron was born on the ridgetop farm and worked with the land under his parents Jerome and Paula Lange's stewardship. He left home to study at Berea College, where completion of the pre-med program deepened his understanding of the complexity and beauty of the natural world. Aaron's personal agricultural studies have allowed him to encounter new teachers and mentors, including farmers employing different styles and systems than his family used. Aaron returned to the farm after college and assumed a portion of the family land to try his style of organic farming with reduced tillage and bio-intensive practices, using cover crops, integrating livestock and developing and maintaining standardized, permanent beds in field blocks to allow for intentional crop rotations.

Irina volunteered on the family farm and worked alongside the Langes. She and Aaron formed their own family, welcoming their son Jonathan in 2022, just as the couple reached majority management of the farm. Irina and Aaron share most of the responsibilities on the farm, including crop production, livestock management, marketing, sales and herding their growing toddler.

Foxfire Farm now cultivates 2.5 acres of low-till certified organic greens, herbs, roots and diverse vegetables. They sell their produce through a wide array of markets, including a local CSA program, farmers markets, restaurants, groceries and wholesale buyers.

Join this OAK Field Day with Aaron Lange as he shares Foxfire Farm's 2.5-acre certified organic vegetable fields, covered production and greenhouse, highlighting: three-year crop rotations integrated with cover crops and grazing sheep; high tunnel and field production for year-round harvest; reduced tillage using standardized beds, mulching and soil-building techniques and harvest and packing efficiencies for reduced time and labor. Aaron will provide demonstrations and specific crop examples of harvest techniques, wash-pack systems, crop transitions and bed-flipping. ## **Policy Updates**

## Farm Bill Reauthorization Proposals Emerge from Senate and House Agriculture Committees

The Senate Agriculture Committee and the House Agriculture Committee released their respective versions of the Farm Bill in May. Markups are happening now and then the two committees will have months of meetings to reconcile their versions of these 1000 page documents into a unified Farm Bill. Read the National Sustainable Agriculture Coalition's (NSAC's) analysis of the Senate Agriculture Committee's Farm Bill draft that shows momentum toward a bipartisan farm bill reauthorization with Chairwoman Debbie Stabenow's (D-MI) release of a detailed section-by-section description of its farm bill reauthorization proposal. The Rural Prosperity and Food Security Act framework charts a path for completing a farm bill this year. The National Sustainable Agriculture Coalition (NSAC) also shared an in-depth analysis of the House Agriculture Committee's version of the bill, the Farm, Food, and National Security Act, and found that the bill fails to take meaningful steps toward a more fair, resilient and equitable food and farm system. A summary statement from the Organic Trade Association and another from the National Organic Coalition similarly share that the House draft fails to adequately address the forward-looking critical needs of the organic sector, thereby missing a significant

opportunity to bolster rural economies and support farmers seeking to participate in this rapidly expanding market.

## Opportunities, the Latest News & Calls to Action

### **Organic Certification Cost Share Program**

Organic Certification Cost Share Program (OCCSP) is available for operations submitting applications or renewing certification. OCCSP provides cost share assistance to producers and handlers of agricultural products who are obtaining or renewing their certification under the National Organic Program (NOP). Certified operations may receive up to 75 percent of their certification costs paid during the program year, not to exceed \$750 per certification scope. The deadline to apply is October 31, 2024. Some certifiers process cost share requests through the certification application, others do not. If your certifier does not process certification cost share then you can apply for cost share through your local USDA Farm Services Agency office. # NOSB: Request For Applications to fill FIVE Board Vacancies - due June 28

The National Organic Standards Board was established to assist in developing standards for substances to be used in organic production and to advise the Secretary on the implementation of the Organic Foods Production Act of 1990. Through this Notice, the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) is requesting nominations to fill the following vacancies:

- One individual who owns or operates an organic farming operation or employee of such individual;
- Two individuals who own or operate an organic handling operation or employees of such individuals;
- One individual who owns or operates a retail establishment with significant trade in organic products or employees of such individuals; and
- One individual with expertise in areas of environmental protection and resource conservation.

Appointees will serve a five-year term beginning January 2025 and ending January 2030. USDA Commits Greater Conservation Assistance for Producers Transitioning to Organic Production On April 10, 2023, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced details about its \$75 million investment in conservation assistance for producers transitioning to organic production. The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is dedicating financial and technical assistance to a new organic management standard and partnering with new organic technical experts to increase staff capacity and expertise. NRCS will dedicate \$70 million to assist producers with a new organic management standard under the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). This program is for farmers who are beginning or in the process of transitioning to organic certification. OAK is in conversation with NRCS Kentucky and will work to communicate with farmers about the opportunity to apply for this new Organic Management Practice when it is available. #### \$1 Billion Available to Help Farmers Invest in Renewable Energy

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that USDA is accepting applications starting on April 1 for \$1 billion in grants to help agricultural producers and rural small businesses invest in renewable energy systems and make energy-efficiency improvements. USDA is making the \$1 billion in grants available under the Rural Energy for America Program (REAP), with funding from President Biden's landmark Inflation Reduction Act, the nation's largest-ever investment in combating the climate crisis. #### Silvopasture and Forest Farming Support / Funds Available

The Catalyzing Agroforestry Grant Program is focused on implementing silvopastures and forest farming practices through direct support payments and will assist producers in designing appropriate projects using technical assistance and science-based planning strategies. The ultimate goal of the

effort is to increase ecosystem sustainability and diversity by scaling up agroforestry practices. The Appalachian Beginning Forest Farming Coalition (ABFFC) project will provide up to \$1500/acre for silvopasture implementation and up to \$1000/quarter acre for forest farming implementation depending on project scale and scope. To enhance shared learning, producers who receive support will share successes and lessons-learned with their peers and other interested stakeholders. Overview: The KSU Small Scale Farm Grant is designed with the small operation farmer in mind. This grant application is relatively simple to complete and the funds can be used to purchase needed equipment related to the proposed project. To qualify, applicants must be producing a value-added product, be an organic farmer, and/or be an aquatic farmer. Farmers markets are often eligible. Previously approved projects have included canning equipment, a walk-in cooler, a water line to a hoop house, a root cellar, a cool-bot for vegetables, and a trailer for keeping meat cool and recently added farmer education assistance with a maximum of \$500.

**Deadline**: On-going

Funding Amount: Up to 10% annual gross farm income, max at \$8,000 per year; \$1 for \$1 match

Overview: The Kentucky Proud Promotional Grant is a cost share program to help Kentucky farmers and agribusinesses pay for advertising and marketing expenses. The award amount is based on 10% of direct farm impact; for a farmer it would be 10% of their total farm gross sales. The applicant must be a registered member of Kentucky Proud to apply and use the Kentucky Proud logo/brand in marketing efforts paid for with program funds. Examples of fundable items include TV ads, radio ads, web expenses, hats, t-shirts, demos, sampling, labels, packaging, tradeshows, UPC, and bar codes. This is a great program that helps promote our local farms!

#### **ON-Farm Energy Efficiency Incentives Program**

Funding Amounts: 50% cost share - up to a \$10,000 incentive, plus \$150 for an approved third party energy audit

Overview: The Kentucky Agricultural Development Fund offers an On-Farm Energy Efficiency Program to help Kentucky farmers with energy projects. These cost share funds are available to increase on farm energy efficiency and to support renewable fuel production projects. The applicant is required to

have a third party energy audit completed. This program can be combined with the USDA-NRCS Rural Energy for America Program (REAP) to get up to 75% of a total project cost covered.
