Educational and Farming Support

Grants Available to Advance Recycling Infrastructure and Prevent Wasted Food

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency announced \$117 million for three separate funding opportunities to advance recycling infrastructure and boost food waste prevention education across the country. Two of the notices are for Solid Waste Infrastructure for Recycling grants – one funding opportunity for Tribes and intertribal consortia and another for communities (such as cities, counties, and parishes) across the country. The third notice is for EPA's Recycling Education and Outreach grant program, focused on food waste prevention and composting. Applications due by December 20, 2024.

Engage with Local County Committee Elections with Farm Service Agency

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) mailed ballots last week for the Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committee elections to all eligible agricultural producers and private landowners across the country. Elections are occurring in certain Local Administrative Areas (LAA) for these committee members who make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally. Producers and landowners must return ballots to their local FSA county office or have their ballots postmarked by Dec. 2, 2024, for those ballots to be counted. https://www.fsa.usda.gov/about-fsa/county-committee-elections

Community-Based Garden Support Available

Approximately \$1 million in funding is available from the <u>People's Garden Initiative</u> through USDA's Office of Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production, in partnership with The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation's (NFWF) 2025 Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration program. The program will

fund projects that support community-based gardens promoting sustainable agriculture practices that benefit people and wildlife. Applications will be accepted until January 30, 2025. Project must meet the People's Garden criteria:

- Join the People's Garden community by registering a garden at <u>usda.gov/peoples-garden</u>
- Grow the garden using sustainable practices that benefit people and wildlife
- Teach about gardening and resilient, local food systems

Priority will be given to projects that

- Educate and train local citizens, build diverse partnerships, foster local food systems and provide other socio-economic benefits
- Provide measurable ecological, educational and community benefits
- Support the conservation of fish, wildlife, and habitat, especially at-risk species including migratory birds and pollinators

Farm to Food System Guide Features Louisville's Change Today, Change Tomorrow

"Farm to Food Assistance: A Model for Values-Based, Equity Centered Approaches to Transforming the Food System" makes the case for how Farm to Food Assistance can contribute to the transformation of a food system from one that produces commodities and derives wealth for a few to one that produces food, health and wellbeing for all. We explore how values-based, equity-centered Farm to Food Assistance reveals and works to overcome the contradictions inherent in the food banking economy and delineate the core values and strategies that move the food assistance system from charity to justice. We also enumerate the most pressing challenges and offer recommendations for practitioners and supporters to advance the goals and outcomes of Farm to Food Assistance efforts across the county.

Fund-a-Farmer Grant Applications

Each autumn FACT opens up another round of <u>Fund-A-Farmer grants</u> to support high welfare, humane, pasture-based livestock and poultry farmers. Eligible projects are awarded to farmers transitioning away from confinement, improving pastures and generally improving the well-being of their food animals.

Applications are now <u>OPEN</u> but keep an eye on the calendar because they close December 8, 2024.

Towards a Federal Policy Platform To Support Farmers Faced with PFAS Contamination

MOFGA met with American Farmland Trust along with representatives from the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry (DACF), Maine Farmland Trust, Defend Our Health and other groups active in Washington, D.C. to discuss a federal policy platform to support farmers faced with PFAS contamination. This diverse group, representing national industry groups, environmental groups and everyone in between, was able to come to a strong consensus in support of the Relief for Farmers Hit with PFAS Act, addressing PFAS contamination from sludge and needed areas of PFAS research. Maine Organic Farmers and Gardeners is urging farmers to support the Relief for Farmers Hit with PFAS act.
