# **Advocacy**



### People & Places Participants Make an Impact in DC

Over 105 in-person Congressional meetings were held on October 7 by community developers from across the country who participated in the People & Places Conference. The People & Places Collaborative organized Capitol Hill Day and carried it forward during the government shutdown. More than 160 community developers from 28 states and 64 congressional districts participated in the meetings, endorsing policies that strengthen affordable housing, small business, and equitable representation in federal decision-making. #### **National Voice**

#### **HOME Reform Act of 2025 Introduced in the House of Representatives**

Chairman Mike Flood (R-NE) and Ranking Member Emanuel Cleaver (D-MO) of the Housing and Insurance Subcommittee of the House Financial Services Committee introduced the HOME Reform Act of 2025 (H.R. 5798) on October 21. The Community Opportunity Alliance endorsed the legislation, which would make numerous changes to the administration of the HOME Investment Partnerships Program. We look forward to working with Representatives Flood and Cleaver as the bill works its way through the legislative process.

The ongoing government shutdown will unfortunately delay critical next steps for the bill. It's widely expected that some work will have to be done to reconcile differences among a number of HOME-related legislative actions, including the ROAD to Housing bill introduced by Senator Tim Scott (R-SC) and the HOME reauthorization bill introduced by Senator Cortez Masto (D-NV).


#### **Senate Passes ROAD to Housing Act**

The ROAD to Housing Act, endorsed by the Community Opportunity Alliance, was passed by the Senate on October 9 by a bipartisan 77–20 vote. The bill would reduce barriers, streamline permitting, and expand the nation's housing supply. The Alliance's endorsement of the bill was recognized in both the majority and minority press releases announcing its passage. The ROAD to Housing Act advanced as part of the broader National Defense Authorization Act. With the ongoing government shutdown, lawmakers may need to restart the process in 2026.

#### Reductions in Force (RIFs) Hit Housing and Community Development Agencies

The Trump Administration is using layoffs and RIFs as a negotiating tactic to advance the President's priorities during the government shutdown. RIFs have been reported at the Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFI) Fund at the Treasury Department, the Office of Community Services at the Department of Health & Human Services, and numerous offices at the Department of Housing and Community Development, including the Community Planning Development, Public and Indian Housing, Field Offices, Fair Housing, and Housing Counseling, among others. RIFs at the CDFI Fund, in particular, have drawn bipartisan criticism from lawmakers. Our People & Places partners at NALCAB have created a social media toolkit for advocates to voice support for the CDFI Fund.

#### **People & Places: A National Gathering for Community Developers**

The Community Opportunity Alliance proudly joined four national community development organizations to co-host the People & Places Conference. This powerful gathering of more than 350 community developers from across the nation was held on October 5-7 in Washington, DC. Participants explored innovative ways to effectively serve their communities during these challenging times, advocated on Capitol Hill for federal support, and envisioned how to chart a path forward for our field. During the plenary sessions, funders, community developers, and cross-sector partners discussed how philanthropy can evolve during shrinking federal support — and how community developers can help rebuild civic trust and connection. #### New Jersey Member Launches 501(c)4 Action Fund

The Housing & Community Development Network of New Jersey (the Network) launched the Housing & Community Development Network Action Fund (HCDN Action Fund), a 501(c)4 organization. The HCDN Action Fund will be able to engage directly in the political process to identify and promote leaders who share key values. It will strengthen advocacy efforts, lobby, and organize community education initiatives to support policies that prioritize housing as a human right.

"New Jersey does not lack ideas to solve our housing affordability, security and stability crisis. However, we are sorely missing the political will needed to implement bold, meaningful, long-term solutions to make sure everyone can afford to call New Jersey home," said Staci Berger, vice chair of the Action Fund and president & chief executive officer of the Network. "The Network Action Fund will give our members another tool to help them advocate for laws and policies,

#### **Conference & Upcoming Report Focus on Supporting Emerging Professionals**

The Let's Talk Talent: Building Careers in Community Development session at the People & Places Conference crowd-sourced ideas for career development in our field. Ideas include:

- **Developing more entry- and mid-level jobs**. Participants discussed the need to give advancing professionals "somewhere to go."
- Building networks and mentorship opportunities. Suggestions included offering peer groups and roundtables for people with similar jobs, expanding mentorship programs, and providing job- shadowing opportunities.
- Sharing resources among organizations. For example, organizations can share a staff member to create a full-time position and share technical assistance coaching.
- **Strengthening the pipeline:** Participants emphasized the need to protect career pathways like AmeriCorps and partnerships between universities and community development organizations.

We will be releasing a report later this year — Supporting Emerging Leaders by Joseph McNeely —- that confirms these ideas. He found that the field has a strong training infrastructure, but little systemic support for career development. Stay tuned for recommendations on how our field can implement solutions.

#### **Building Pathways to Economic Self-Sufficiency**

#### Department of Housing and Urban Development I December 2 Deadline

Grants ranging from \$272,255 to \$816,750 are available through the Resident Opportunity and Self-Sufficiency Service Coordinator Program to assist residents of Public and Indian Housing in achieving economic and housing self-sufficiency. Nonprofit organizations are eligible to apply. Funding supports hiring or retaining service coordinators who help residents overcome educational, employment, and health barriers to stability.
